ASSISTIVE TECHNOLOGY

HB 501 Schroer Issue 1

Criminalizes the disclosure of medical marijuana patients' information to unauthorized parties **Status:** 1/7/21 Second Read (H)

*HB 755 Christofanelli

Modifies provisions regarding unlawful actions by persons knowingly infected with communicable diseases

This bill changes the laws regarding knowingly infecting HIV to any serious or infectious communicable disease. A serious or infectious communicable disease is defined as a non-airborne disease spread from person to person that is fatal or causes long-term disabling consequences without lifelong treatment or of being management. It allows individuals to be a donor if a physician deems it medically appropriate. The language is changed to "knowingly expose" and "act in a reckless manner." The felony classes for the specific offenses mentioned in the bill are changed. It includes provisions regarding the release of the exposed individuals identifying information in legal proceedings. It also includes the act of an offender endangering someone at a secure facility if the offender causes or attempts to cause someone to come in contact with bodily fluids scientifically shown to be a means of transmission for serious infectious and communicable diseases.

SB 65 Rehder

Modifies provisions relating to persons knowingly infected with communicable diseases

Under current law, it is illegal for a person knowingly infected with HIV to donate blood, organs, tissue, or sperm, unless for medical research, as well as illegal for such person to act recklessly in exposing another person to HIV without their knowledge and consent. This act modifies those provisions to make it unlawful for a person knowingly infected with a serious infectious or communicable disease to: (1) donate blood, organs, tissue, or sperm, unless for medical research or as deemed medically appropriate by a licensed physician; (2) knowingly expose another person to the disease through an activity that creates a substantial risk of transmission; or (3) act in a reckless manner by exposing another person to the disease through an activity that creates a substantial risk of disease transmission. A "serious infectious or communicable disease" is defined as a non-airborne disease spread from person to person that is fatal or causes disabling long-term consequences in the absence of lifelong treatment and management. The penalty for donation of blood, organs, tissue, or sperm while knowingly

infected with the disease or knowingly exposing another person to the disease shall be a Class D felony, rather than the current Class B felony, and a Class C felony, rather than the current Class A felony, if the victim contracts the disease. The penalty for recklessly exposing another person is a Class A misdemeanor. It shall be an affirmative defense to this offense if the person exposed to the disease knew that the infected person was infected with the disease at the time of the exposure and consented to the exposure. This act specifies the actions to be taken during a judicial proceeding to protect the identifying information of the victim and the defendant from public release, except as otherwise specified. Additionally, this act changes similar provisions involving exposure of persons in correctional centers, jails, or certain mental health facilities to HIV or hepatitis B or C to exposure to a serious infectious or communicable disease.

Extends and relocates the trauma-informed schools pilot program

This bill changes the schools in the trauma-informed schools pilot program to schools in a metropolitan school district. The program is extended until June 30, 2025. The Department of Elementary and Secondary Education must submit a program report to the general assembly on or before December 31, 2025. **Status:** 1/12/21 Second Read (H)

This bill creates allows municipalities and special districts employing firefighters to create the voluntary firefighter cancer benefit trust. Firefighters employed by trust participants may collect benefits from the trust if they developed cancer as a result of being employed as a firefighter.

SB 45 Hough

Creates new provisions relating to certain firefighters who contracted certain types of cancer as a result of employment as a firefighter

This act allows for the creation of a Voluntary Firefighter Cancer Benefits Trust. Under the act, any municipality or special district that employs firefighters who meet certain qualifications may make contributions to a Voluntary Firefighter Cancer Benefits Trust. The board of trustees of any trust created for the purposes of this act is subject to the Sunshine Law. The trust is then required to make payments to covered individuals based upon the type of cancer with which the covered individual was diagnosed. The maximum amount that may be paid out from the trust for a particular cancer diagnosis in a covered individual is \$249,000. Benefits may be reduced by 25% if the covered individual used a tobacco product within the 5 years immediately preceding the cancer diagnosis. Any trust created for the purposes of this act may accept or apply for grants or donations from any private or public source. Furthermore, any such trust may apply for grants from the state fire marshal. This provision expires June 30, 2022.

This act modifies that provision such that to receive payment under this provision a child must also be a dependent. The act additionally repeals a requirement that payment be made to the estate of an employee in the event that he or she does not have a spouse or dependent children.

FEES FOR RECORDING OF INSTRUMENTS

Under current law, a user fee of four dollars is charged for the recording of any instrument with the county recorder of deeds. An additional fee of three dollars is charged for the recording of certain instruments, such as deeds, mortgages, conveyances, and deeds of trust, which is then deposited in the Missouri Housing Trust Fund. The county recorder of deeds collects these fees and remit them to the Department of Revenue. This act changes the additional fee for the recording of these certain instruments from three dollars to nine dollars.

HOUSING TRUST FUND

Under current law, the money in the Missouri Housing Trust Fund is used to financially assist households with a combined adjusted gross income equal to or less to certain percentages of the median family income for the geographical area. This act modifies these provisions to include households with a combined adjusted gross income equal to or less than 50% of the median family income to be eligible for financial assistance for housing. This act also provides that households with a combined adjusted gross income equal to or less than 30% shall be eligible for financial assistance for certain residential occupancy projects. Finally, this act requires that no less than 50% of the funds shall be allocated to rental support projects.

HB 801 Bland Manlove

Creates provisions for automatic voter registration

This bill instructs the Secretary of State's office to establish a process to conduct automatic voter registration by January 1, 2023. This will include obtaining a list from the Department of Revenue of individuals with driver's licenses and nondriver ID cards and developing recommendations for local election authorities. These recommendations will checked for eligibility by local election authorities. Local election authorities will send postcards to an individual giving he/she an opportunity to decline being registered and placed on the list. After one month all names with unreturned postcards will be added to the list. Any time a postcard is received the name is removed from the list. It also requires the Department of Corrections to submit information to the Secretary of State's office regarding individuals who have been discharged unconditionally from probation, parole, or incarceration. The information will then be provided to election authorities for voter registration purposes.

HB 815 Schwadron

Modifies provisions for elections

This bill would allow any voter to vote absentee at a location designated by the election authority without having to provide a reason. It would allow a voter to vote absentee by mail if he/she is prevented from going to the polling place because of an illness or disability or being the primary caregiver for someone with an illness or disability. The application to request to vote absentee by mail will include a place for the reason the voter is voting by mail. It requires individuals to establish their identities at the election authority prior to voting absentee by mail. Procedures for receiving a provisional ballot are also included. **Status:** 1/14/21 Second Read (H)

HB 842 Hill

Requires that all ballots be in paper form

This bill designates the paper ballot as the official ballot beginning January 1, 2022. After January 1, 2024 electronic voting machines are not allowed to be used to cast ballots. Voters with disabilities are allowed to use the machines until they need to be replaced or until January 1, 2024. The machines will be replaced with paper ballot marking devices designed to assist voters with disabilities.

Additionally, the use of remaining direct-record electronic voting machines shall be phased out upon mechanical failure. **Status:** 1/12/21 First Read (S)

This bill requires all medical and mental health professionals to immediately evaluate minors who contact them for mental health care to determine whether he or she presents an imminent danger to self or others. The professional is required to provide treatment or make an appropriate treatment referral. If a minor consents to mental health treatment, the provider is required to keep all records confidential and is not allowed to share them with any parents or guardians unless the minor provides consent or is an imminent danger to self or others. Parents and guardians are not allowed to prohibit or interfere with any treatment unless the minor provides consent or is an imminent danger to self or others.
